PREVIEW OF **NEXT** WEEK'S READINGS

TWENTY-SIXTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

First Reading: Amos 6:1a, 4-7

Amos denounces the selfish attitude of those who surround themselves with luxuries with no concern for others. He goes on to warn that because these people lacked interest in the state of their society, they would be the first to be exiled.

Second Reading: 1 Timothy 6:11-16

Paul tells Timothy to seek integrity, faith and love. Paul urges him to attain everlasting life by maintaining strong faith in Jesus and in God until Jesus returns.

Gospel: Luke 16:19-31

Jesus tells of a rich man who feasted daily, while a beggar named Lazarus went hungry outside his gates. When both men died, Lazarus was taken to Abraham, but the rich man was in torment. When he begged for mercy, Abraham reminded him that Lazarus had lived in torment, while the rich man lived in selfish luxury. The man then asked if Lazarus could be sent to his brothers to warn them. But Abraham said if they had not heeded Moses or the prophets, they would ignore even the warning of one risen from the dead.

CELEBRATING THE CHURCH'S LITURGY IN SIGNS AND SYMBOLS

CONTINUED

THE USE AND SYMBOLISM OF INCENSE:

The use of incense in religious worship predates Christianity by thousands of years. First in the East and later in the West, incense use has long been an integral part of many religious celebrations. The Bible mentions incense 170 times. The use of incense in Jewish temple worship continued well after the establishment of Christianity and certainly influenced the Catholic Church's use of incense in liturgical celebrations. The use of incense within the liturgies continued to be developed over many years into what we are familiar with today.

What does the Bible say about the use of incense? In the Old Testament God commanded His people to burn incense; "Aaron must burn fragrant incense on the altar every morning when he tends the lamps" (Ex. 30:7), and "Moses placed the gold altar in the tent of meeting in front of the curtain and burned fragrant incense on it, as the LORD commanded him" (Ex..40:26-27). Also "and in every place incense will be offered to my name, and a pure offering. For my name will be great among the nations, says the Lord of hosts" (Malach. 1:11). St. John tells us in the Book of Revelations: "Another angel with a golden censer came and stood at the altar; he was given a great quantity of incense to offer with the prayers of all the saints on the golden altar that is before the throne. And the smoke of the incense, with the prayers of the saints, rose before God from the hand of the angel." (8:4)

Its meaning and use in the liturgy: Incense is a sacramental, used to venerate, bless, and sanctify. Its smoke conveys a sense of mystery and awe. It is a reminder of the sweet-smelling presence of our Lord. Its use adds a feeling of solemnity to the Mass. The visual imagery of the smoke and the smell reinforce the transcendence of the Mass linking Heaven with Earth, allowing us to enter into the presence of God. The smoke symbolizes the burning zeal of faith that should consume all Christians, while the fragrance symbolizes Christian virtue. Incensing may also be viewed in the context of a "burnt offering" given to God. In the Old Testament animal offerings were partially or wholly consumed by fire. In essence, to burn something was to give it to God. In his monograph Sacred Signs, Monsignor Romano Guardini (1885-1968), who greatly influenced the writings of Pope Benedict XVI, had these beautiful words to say about the use of incense: The offering of an incense is a generous and beautiful rite. The bright grains of incense are laid upon the redhot charcoal, the censer is swung, and the fragrant smoke rises in clouds. In the rhythm and the sweetness there is a musical quality. In a more practical visual sense as the fragrant smoke ascends it also symbolizes our prayers rising to heaven. The General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM) has this to say about the use of incense: § 75. "The bread and wine are placed on the altar by the priest to the accompaniment of the

prescribed formulas. The priest may incense the gifts placed upon the altar and then incense the cross and the altar itself, so as to signify the Church's offering and prayer rising like incense in the sight of God. Next, the priest, because of his sacred ministry, and the people, by reason of their baptismal dignity, may be incensed by the deacon or another minister". The GIRM provides instruction for the use of incense during the celebration of the Mass as follows: § 277 The priest, having put incense into the thurible, blesses it with the sign of the Cross, without saying anything. Before and after an incensation, a profound bow is made to the person or object that is incensed, except for the incensation of the altar and the offerings for the Sacrifice of the Mass. Incense may be used optionally in any form of Mass: a) during the Entrance Procession; b) at the beginning of Mass, to incense the cross and the altar; c) at the procession before the Gospel and the proclamation of the Gospel itself; d) after the bread and the chalice have been placed on the altar, to incense the offerings, the cross, and the altar, as well as the Priest and the people; e) at the elevation of the host and the chalice after the Consecration.

Incense used at the Divine Services represents: a. Adoration or the worship paid to God alone, present in the Eucharist. b. Prayer, which rises to God like smoke. c. Grace, which God pours into our souls as incense pours fragrance throughout the Church.

The Church incenses relics, icons and Holy things: a. To honor God who crowned the saints in heaven, who worked wonders through them here on earth, who sanctified and glorified their bodies. b. To show respect and devotion to the special friends and servants of the Almighty.

The Church incenses her ministers, her bishops and priests, in order to honor in their person Jesus Christ, whom they represent and with whose sacred character they are clothed. The Church incenses the faithful in order to honor in them the likeness to Christ which was imprinted upon them in Baptism to show them forth as the temples of the Holy Spirit. At the censing of the parishioners make the sign of the cross upon their bodies in respect to this meaning. The Church incenses the bodies of the departed to honor the bodies which were sanctified and made holy by Baptism, and to beg God to receive the prayers and petitions we offer for the repose of the soul of the departed in the Faith.

Incense shows forth several things: Its burning represents zeal in the service of the Lord. Think of that as you see the sacred smoke rising in the Sanctuary. Recall that you are to give of your time and talent, your service and means to the worship of God. Are you going to let a mere material creature like incense outdo you in divine service? The incense is burnt for the glory of God. How about you? Its fragrance represents virtue, pleasing to God as it always is. How pleasing is your life and your service? The smoke reminds you to pray, if you are not praying. The fragrance of the smoke shows that our prayer and service are pleasing to God. Think of what all this means and it will be a source of grace and spiritual strength to you.
