

PREVIEW OF **NEXT** WEEK'S READINGS THE PRESENTATION OF THE LORD

First Reading: Malachi 3:1-4

The prophet Malachi speaks to us about God sending a messenger "to prepare the way" and that God will suddenly come and appear at the temple. Malachi continues by telling us the offerings of Judah and Jerusalem will be pleasing to God.

Second Reading: Hebrews 2:14-18

Jesus became like us. He shared fully in our humanity. By his death he freed us from the fear of death. Because Jesus was tested by suffering, he is able to help those who are also tempted.

Gospel: Luke 2:22-40

According to the law of Moses, Joseph and Mary brought Jesus to the temple to be consecrated. They offered a sacrifice according to the law, "a pair of turtle doves or two young pigeons." Simeon, a holy and righteous man, took the child into his arms and praised God. Simeon then spoke to Mary. He told Mary that Jesus "is destined to be the downfall and the rise of many in Israel." Anna, a prophet of great age, praised God and spoke of the child who came for the redemption of Jerusalem.

JUSTICE & PEACE

IMPACT UPDATE

FIRST RUNG COLLABORATIVE (YOUTH UNEMPLOYMENT INITIATIVE): On January 9th, we had a very positive meeting. 13 IMPACT leaders met with Dr. Richard Shannon, VP of UVA Health Affairs, and Trish Cluff, Associate VP of Strategic Relations. Our 2 years of hard work, research, and follow up with decision makers and allies was affirmed. He understands our request for tuition waivers and mentors for young adults seeking entry level healthcare jobs. He is concerned, as we are, about barriers to employment. He made a commitment to work with us. We expect another meeting before January ends so stay tuned for an update after the research meeting February 20th.

MENTAL HEALTH PROJECT: After meeting with six local care providers and mental health organizations, our research committee has identified two reoccurring and urgent problem areas: Psychiatric Care (Individuals have trouble accessing quality affordable psychiatric care for their children regardless of their income. There is a shortage of child psychiatric care in our area and many providers do not accept insurance and require private payment; limited providers accept Medicaid payments.) & Early Intervention (In the past, individuals have had trouble accessing preventive counseling services and do not know where to begin when they feel they are in need of help. Access to care and counseling early on is essential, seeing as one-half of all chronic mental illness begins by the age of 14; three-quarters by age 24.). Specific questions about these two areas will continue to be pursued in the coming weeks. Please take home an in-depth version of these two problem areas; flyers are available on the credenza in the commons area.



FROM THE PASTOR

WHY WE DO WHAT WE DO IN THE CATHOLIC WORSHIP THE CATHOLIC LITURGICAL PROCESSIONS [CONTINUED]

Advent, Christmas and New Year made me to break into the series about "Why we do what we do in the Catholic worship" with the subtitle "The catholic processions". As I pointed out previously, processions are not just the way to get people or ministers from here to there. They are themselves a ritual expression of who we are and what we are about. We are pilgrims on a journey. This time I want to reflect with you the meaning of our COMMUNION PROCESSION.

The Church understands the Communion Procession, in fact every procession in liturgy, as a sign of the pilgrim Church, the body of those who believe in Christ, on their way to the Heavenly Jerusalem. All our lives we who believe in Christ are moving in time toward that moment when we will be taken by death from this world and enter into the joy of the Lord in the eternal Kingdom he has prepared for us.

I would like to point out that the Communion rite of the Mass begins with the Lord's Prayer and ends when the priest concludes with the prayer after Communion. The rite is made up of four basic gestures or expressions: the Lord's Prayer, the peace greeting, the breaking of the bread, and the reception of Communion. One powerful moment that is often overlooked in this sequence of events is our manner of approaching the holy table to receive Communion. But before we approach the altar we are invited. The invitation has often been overlooked or ignored. It would not be appropriate, even for special ministers of the Eucharist, to approach the altar until the invitation is given. The invitation, in its new translation, is the announcement, "Behold the Lamb of God, behold him who takes away the sins of the world. Blessed are those called to the supper of the Lamb." Our response to the invitation comes with an unfortunate translation. Our "Lord I am not worthy" reflects none of the trustful confidence of the original Latin words. The clever Latin original is almost impossible to reproduce in English with the original's overtones of confidence and hope. What the Latin really means is "Happy indeed are we, for though we are sinners, you call us to your table."

Then we approach the altar in a liturgical procession. Communion Procession is not simply about getting up out of one's seat, walking to the minister, receiving communion and walking back to one's seat and sitting down again. In other words, we are not just lining up to wait our turn, like people in line at a supermarket check-out stand. Rather we are a part of one of the four liturgical processions of the Mass: the entrance procession, the procession with the book of gospels, the procession with the gifts of bread and wine, and the Communion procession. In this parish we begin the Communion procession with the people who are in the back of the church rather than with those in the front. This seems to make for a better appearance of a long, joyous procession, and also provides for a smoother flow of the procession towards the holy table. This procession is a ritual way of getting from one place to another, and doing so with a particular mood. A funeral procession is rather somber, but the Communion procession is joyous ("Happy are those who are called ..."), and its joyous nature is expressed particularly in song. Liturgical directives about music tell us that the Communion procession song is not supposed to foster a sense of adoration but rather a sense of unity - a sense that we are approaching the Eucharistic table not as isolated individuals but as a united community. The Communion rite is not first of all about a personal encounter we are having with Christ in the Eucharist, but rather it is about sharing the Eucharistic presence of the risen Christ. The Communion rite is designed to convey a sense that sharing at the Eucharistic table is an anticipation of sharing the eternal banquet in the kingdom of heaven.
