<u>KEVIN HART LECTURES:</u> Kevin Hart continues his lecture series on the Nicene Creed today (the 19th) and next Sunday (the 26th) after the 11 am masses in the downstairs commons. Feel free to bring "adult refreshments" for our spread. The series explores the theological battles of 4th century bishops as they struggled to articulate what would become the orthodox positions of the church on such topics as the Trinity and the nature of the relation among the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Dr. Hart is the Edwin B. Kyle Professor of Christian Studies at UVA, and former chair of the university's department of Religious Studies. He recently edited *Jean-Luc Marion: The Essential Works* (from Fordham University Press and in our Holy Comforter library), and author of the very recently published *Kingdoms of God*, the topic of last year's lecture series.

FROM THE PASTOR SOMETHING TO HOLD ON TO? THE ROSARY



Recently, I came across the following words written by a Redemptorist priest by the name of Father John Hamrogue...."The rosary is clearly something to hold on to, literally hold on to, like a rope in the ocean. In grave illness or death, it will be enough just to clutch the rosary or wordlessly rub the beads." There are times in my own life when, feeling somewhat "low" before falling asleep, I hold my rosary without attempting to recite it, in order to make contact with the higher power.

Pope Francis said; "The Rosary is a prayer that always accompanies me; it is also the prayer of the ordinary people and the saints ... it's a prayer from my heart." Reflecting over the first year of Francis' pontificate, Mgr. Alfred Xuereb, the Pope's former secretary, told Vatican Radio: "Pope Francis "does not waste a minute! He works tirelessly and, when he feels the need to take a moment's pause, he closes his eyes and does nothing: he simply sits and prays the Rosary. He prays at least three Rosaries a day I think. "This helps me unwind" he told me. Then he sets to work again."

Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI's address at the Basilica of St. Mary Major, where he prayed the rosary with the faithful a few years back said: "Today, together we confirm that the Holy Rosary is not a pious practice banished to the past, like prayers of other times thought of with nostalgia. Instead, the Rosary is experiencing a new Springtime.-- "The Rosary, when it is prayed in an authentic way, not mechanical and superficial but profoundly, it brings, in fact, peace and reconciliation. It contains within itself the healing power of the Most Holy Name of Jesus, invoked with faith and love at the center of each "Hail Mary".

On October 16, 2002, the 24th Anniversary of his election as Roman Pontiff, Pope John Paul II signed the Apostolic Letter Rosarium Virginis Mariae (**the Rosary of the Virgin Mary**) that presents the Rosary as an outstanding way to contemplate the face and mysteries of Christ. He also proclaimed a "Year of the Rosary", which extended from October 2002 to October 2003.

If these three spiritual giants of our time pray(ed) the rosary and insist on the recitation and meditation of the Rosary, it is because they know the Church and mankind are facing great dangers, like the threats of an impending war and the attacks against the family, that can only be stopped through an intervention from on high. As St. Pope John Paul II wrote: "The Church has always attributed particular efficacy to this prayer, entrusting to the Rosary the most difficult problems. At times when Christianity itself seemed under threat, its deliverance was attributed to the power of this prayer, and Our Lady was acclaimed as the one whose intercession brought salvation."

There are people who do not believe in this prayer of the rosary, claiming that the repetition of the words of the Hail Mary are of no value. But a few things in life need repeating e.g "Please" and "Thank you" and "I'm sorry" and "I love you." The same can be said of the words of the Hail Mary, "Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners....."

There's healing in touching the very beads themselves, a lowly healing maybe, yet something basic and instinctive. When all around is collapsing and the center cannot hold, it is something to hold on to. Someone called the rosary the "Worry beads that brings peace". They let the sense of touch do its healing work. It is not uncommon to find a worried child calms itself to sleep grasping a much loved teddy bear. A frightened adult reaches for a comforting hand in times of stress. Heaven has its own psychology, and the Rosary beads must have a high rating in its pain department. Not just something, but someone! The sacred string of beads is something to hold on to, indeed. But more importantly, someone to hold on to! It is the Nurse of heaven who holds the other end of the golden string. Nurse of the shining white Lamb as an Irish poet called her, Mary invites us to grasp this life-line.
