GLORY TO CHRIST THE SERVANT KING



As we mark Christ the King Sunday this weekend, I want to point out some important lessons we could keep in mind: One who came as a servant, triumphed. The exultant joy of being a follower of Jesus Christ that should never leave us.

In my readings, I came across the following words from one of the songs; from heaven you came helpless babe. Entered our world, your glory veiled. Not to be served but to serve and give your life that we might live. This is our God, The Servant King. He calls us now to follow Him. To bring our lives as a daily offering. Of worship to The Servant King.

St. Paul writing to the Philippians said: "Have this mind among yourselves, which is yours in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied himself, by taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men.(2:5-7). And from the gospel of Mark "For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many."(10:45). Jesus, coming made him a king that was different from all the other kings in all history. He came not to be served, but to be a servant. Think about all the overpaid athletes, entertainers, politicians who travel with entourages, maids, handlers, and all other kinds of servants that take care of all the details of life. A 1st century king could have anything he wanted at any time. Think about King Solomon, a king in Israel a thousand years before Jesus, who wrote Ecc 2: 10 "I denied myself nothing my eyes desired; I refused my heart no pleasure". Jesus is the one of a kind son of the only God in all the universe – the one who all creation was made by and for. Surely he will be the King people expected – giving commands and taking charge, but no way could he do that, he was focused on the mission.

It could be difficult for us to grasp this concept of a Servant King. The Apostle themselves could not. James and John seemed not to fully understand this servant king either. They ask Jesus if they can sit at his right and left hand, but the truth is that Jesus doesn't have that authority. It is not for Jesus to decide! Jesus reminds them of this when he states, **"But to sit at my right hand or at my left is not mine to grant, but it is for those for whom it has been prepared (Mark 10: 40).**

Jesus the Servant King proclaims to each of us; *I am the Son of Man who has come to serve you. I have come to give my life as a ransom. I have come to redeem you from all your captivities. I have come to ransom your life from sin. I have come to ransom your life from the powers of evil. I have come to ransom your life from death. I have come to suffer and die that you might live and serve under the sign of the cross.* His triumph. His victory. Of course we know it is a different kind of triumph than the folks along his path into Jerusalem were likely anticipating. It wasn't a military triumph or a political triumph. He served and He triumphed as king.

If Christ is really King of this world -- and he is! -- then he must be King of my life. And if Christ is really King of my life -- is he? -- then he must be King of every part of my life. I must let him reign in all parts of my life, if he is truly my Lord, my God, my King. So this feast is a great day to ask ourselves whether Christ is truly King of our lives, whether he rules everywhere. If he's king of my life, then he should be king of my time. If he's king of my life, then he must be king of my home. If he's king of my life, then he should be king of my wallet. If he's king of my life, every one of my moral decisions must be geared toward living in his kingdom; in every moral decision we face, there's a choice between Christ the King and Barabbas and the one who seeks to live in His kingdom is the one that says, *'thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven."*
