# RCIA and the Community of Faith It's YOUR job, too!

At the Easter Vigil, we were blessed to welcome two new members to our Catholic Community and we continue to walk with other catechumens and candidates who are discerning their readiness for full initiation into the faith. Our enthusiastic and hard-working coordinator, Diane Auger Smith, along with a team of faithful RCIA catechists and sponsors, have been guiding their journey. To some extent, the rest of us have just been sitting on the sidelines, perhaps cheering them on, but taking a relatively passive role. Our hardworking team deserves our gratitude and kudos for willingly offering their time, talent, and passion for our faith to accompany these catechumens and candidates, not just in the past year, but for many previous years.

As often happens in any ministry, there were some "bumps in the road" in the past year that caused me to explore how we might shift our paradigm a bit to be sure that we are meeting the needs of folks who come to us at various levels of experience and readiness to come into the church. As I've done some research, I've realized that our "one size fits all" model may need some tweaking. Over the next four weeks, I'd like to offer a modified version of the "curriculum" that has been used to catechize seekers of the Catholic faith whose life experiences range from unbaptized and uncatechized to baptized, practicing Christians of other denominations. It is based on an online "course" presented by TeamRCIA© called "RCIA in the Midst of the Community: The Parish Curriculum for Making Disciples." Notice that the title says *Parish* curriculum *in the Community*. That means that *all of us*, by virtue of our Baptism, are called to be part of the RCIA process. "But I don't have time!" you say. "I don't know enough to teach!" Wait! Before you dismiss your role in helping seekers understand what it means to be Catholic, please read on and continue to stay with me for the next few weeks.

First, a few basics: The official universal text used by the Church for the "Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults" is called, not surprisingly, *RCIA!* It contains not only guidelines, but also the prayers for the various rites that take place during the process. Secondly, there is a distinction between *catechumens* – seekers who have not been baptized- and *candidates* – persons who have been baptized in any Christian denomination, Catholic or non-Catholic. Those who have been baptized are already members of the Body of Christ, and no matter how familiar they are with Catholicism, the process for them is different than for catechumens.

Paragraph 4 of RCIA says this: "The initiation of catechumens is a gradual process that takes place within the community of the faithful." (RCIA 4). This might mean doing exactly what we have always done – offered classes once a week taught by catechists and provided various rites during the process. But the next sentence explains more clearly what "within the community of the faithful" actually looks like:

By joining the catechumens in reflecting on the value of the paschal mystery and by renewing their own conversion, the faithful provide an example that will help the catechumens to obey the Holy Spirit more generously (RCIA 4, emphasis mine).

It is "the faithful" who are to "provide an example that will help the catechumens" who will teach them "to obey the Holy Spirit more generously." Notice that it doesn't say "the RCIA team" or "the pastor" or "a presenter" will do this. The responsibility for the experience of our catechumens and candidates rests with ALL of the faithful!

Think about the mission that Christ gave to his disciples and to all of us: "Go therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you" (Matthew 28:19-20). And how did the early Christians do this? Certainly not with PowerPoint, videos, textbooks, and catechisms! They had the basics of the stories of their encounters with Christ and the teachings of those who came before them. The newcomers learned about the faith by *experiencing it*!

Today, Pope Francis suggests that catechesis is helping believers open their hearts to *encounter* the living Christ active in the church. How exactly can we do that in 2018 at Holy Comforter Parish in Charlottesville, VA? That is what we will explore in the coming weeks.
