Encountering the Living Christ An "RCIA Job Description" for the Faithful

During the month of August, our thoughts typically turn from enjoying the last of the "lazy days of summer" to gearing up for a fall season of new beginnings. Back to school, back to the daily routine, back to religious education! Our RCIA team is gearing up again, too; and to initiate the year, they plan to offer two "Inquiry" sessions on August 19 and 26 for anyone considering joining our Catholic family of faith. Last week, I proposed that it is ALL of the faithful who have a responsibility to seek newcomers and to help them not just *learn about* the faith, but to *experience* it. I left you with the question, "how do we do that?" How can we make sure that the parish is intentionally doing the things it does for the benefit of the seekers, catechumens, and candidates?

Paragraph 9 of the *RCIA* text describes a five-part "job description" for the faithful in the work of the RCIA. The first part is in the period called "Evangelization and Pre-catechumenate." Although this is sometimes referred to as the "inquiry" period, notice that it calls on all of us to *evangelize*, or, as the *RCIA* calls it, to ensure "that Christ's message is made known to the world by word and deed and that his grace is communicated" (RCIA 9.1). No, that doesn't mean going out into the streets! The text says that the faithful are to:

- Give evidence of the spirit of the Christian community
- Welcome seekers into their homes
- Welcome seekers into personal conversations
- Welcome seekers into community gatherings

In other words, we are asked to offer hospitality! We do that wherever we go, but especially when seekers come to Mass and whenever they show up for an event in the parish.

Notice that there is no beginning or end to this part of the job since, contrary to what we've always practiced, there is no beginning or end to the period of evangelization and pre-catechumenate. Would we say, "we show hospitality to seekers during the months of August and September, but after that, my job is done?" Of course not! Just as Jesus invites us to follow Him, we invite newcomers by asking them to join us for coffee, to help in the food pantry, to take part in a prayer group or Bible study – the ways are endless!

Once the unbaptized seeker has responded to the faithful's show of hospitality to the point that they want to learn more, they receive the Rite of Acceptance, and enter into an extended period of the Catechumenate. During this phase, both catechumens, and candidates (seekers who are already baptized) learn in greater detail how we as Catholics practice our faith on a daily basis. So part 2 of our job description becomes inviting our catechumens and candidates to experience the life of the church. That includes specific classes provided by our RCIA catechists and others, yes; but it is also attending Mass and taking part in the many activities that happen every week in the parish. Remember, Jesus *knew* the disciples whom he called, he *spent time with them*, he *taught them by example*. Can we argue with the method of the Master? Rather than containing the formation of our catechumens and candidates to a small group of RCIA team members, they learn about what it means to be Catholic from all of us by becoming immersed in the sacramental life of the Church.

Just as an apprentice doesn't just learn a trade; they enter a community of skilled professionals who have mastered the skills, so the catechumen or candidate comes into an environment where they not only learn the trade, but become a member of the guild. The curriculum that the Church gives us at *RCIA* 75 may be broken into four main disciplines: word, community, worship, and witness. We will explore these in the weeks ahead. In the meantime, think about persons you know who might be ready to hear the invitation to "come to the table" with us.
