ADVENT AND THE DIVINE INFANCY (part 1)



"The Most High rules in the kingdom of men, gives it to whomever He will, And sets over it the lowest of men."
(Daniel 4:17)

Advent is here, a time to prepare ourselves for the celebrations of the birth of Christ in the world. In our meditations we shall be reflecting on how God has decided to reveal Himself in the human history. The month of December, according to the Church's traditions, is dedicated to the "Divine Infancy." As with so many consecrated phrases in the Religion, that pairing of words touches upon a great mystery that a "little child" can understand, while the greatest minds of Christendom, past and future, could never completely measure its heights. For a moment, let us situate ourselves somewhere between the little child and the greatest minds — hopefully without ceasing to be childlike. For there to be a "Divine Infancy," there must be an Infant who is God. For that Infant to be known as an infant by us, He must be of our own cognizance — a man like us. In other words, if we do not see a baby, we will not know that Baby; if we do not see a boy, we will not know that Boy. Thus, for there to be the month of the Divine Infancy, there must first have been the Mystery of the Incarnation, the Mystery of the God-made-Man. There is no December 25 without March 25.

Babies are wonderful, innocent, lovable, and so cute. But they also cry and poop and need attention, sometimes in the middle of the night, when parents are trying to get some needed sleep. Which brings us to the wonder of Christmas. The Almighty Creator took shape as a crying, hungry baby born to a Jewish girl in an animal trough in an obscure village in the outskirts of the Roman Empire.

It does not fit in the human understanding that God becomes a child in time, for He is not from any other divine Person. He is God revealing Himself as vulnerable as a baby. It is beyond our understanding that Mary would look at a Divine Person and say, "Thou art My Son." It would be that One Person to whom those words are spoken in eternity by the Father. The human language falls short of bringing out the reality of this Divine Mystery, because nature is overwhelmed by the "Emmanuel" - God with us.

God is present in our world. As Richard Valantasis in his book <u>Centuries of Holiness</u>, has written: "everything in the world—every religious tradition, every scientific exploration, every medical breakthrough, every political situation, the environment, outer space—everything in the world has been altered by the presence of God in the physical universe."

Furthermore, every part of our life—how we eat, bathe, work, play, celebrate or worship—is to be spiritual activity, following the leading of the Holy Spirit. So it is important that to benefit from presence of The Almighty in our midst, we need to be well disposed for that consciousness by digging into this season of Advent, that we may remain open to the Holy Spirit. So that God's will shall be done on earth as it is in heaven.
