FROM THE PASTOR 2018 THE JOURNEY WITH THE MAGI (part 2)



"Where is He who has been born King of the Jews? For we saw His star in the east and have come to worship Him." (Mt. 2:2)

Let me ask a question—one that I wish I could actually have time to hear each of you answer. Here it is: "What began your journey to Christ? What led you to Jesus?" I really would love to hear your replies because those kinds of testimonies are always inspiring to many. I am always inspired when I hear about what got people started on their journey to Jesus. For the Magi, it was the "STAR." We can observe how they journey in stages from the light of a star to the bright and glorious Light of Jesus Christ. And, of course, to authentically encounter the Lord is to experience conversion. All the elements of this story ultimately serve to cause them to "return to their country by another route." The Magi were commonly thought of as astronomers, monitoring and tracking the stars and looking for heavenly bodies as predictors of earthly events. According to what they observed, they knew something important was taking place. What is very odd in the biblical text in verse nine, it says that the star stopped over a building in Bethlehem. How a star could be observable in the heavens from a thousand miles away to guide these starwatchers, and at the same time be localized in this way, remains a complete mystery. Yet that was the experience of these wise men. But what is it that made these men wise, as opposed to purely superstitious? St. Thomas Aquinas thought superstition deviated from true religion because it was either directed at the wrong thing or at the right thing in the wrong manner and the Magi don't fall into such categories because they were using the acceptable norm to seek the truth. Not only were they seeking knowledge in ancient books and scriptures, they were watching the world around them. There were quite a few people who had access to the Jewish scriptures, containing the prophecies of the Messiah. But it seems that only these few noticed this strange light in the heavens and made the connection. The Wise Men were engaged in their world, watching for signs of God. The Magi had a desire to know the truth and were watchful for God's presence and for His plan, for a spiritual lesson to gather from their attentiveness to His movements in time and in their lives. That watchfulness opened the door for them to come face to face with the Savior. How often do we get so caught up in our lives—our family situations, our jobs, our medical problems, day to day tasks and chores, that we fail to be truly watchful, focused, and attentive to God's presence and to His will for our lives? Do you allow your worries, responsibilities, and other things to distract you from the way God is working in you? These distractions are keeping you from meeting Jesus in an intimate way on a regular basis in your life.

Take a moment to think about something in your life that is burdensome or distracting to you in some way. Maybe a relationship or a problem at work or a medical condition is keeping you from seeing how God is working—not necessarily in spite of that obstacle—but through that very obstacle, to make you a "holy" person today. We see the great risk the Magi were willing to take, carrying valuables hundreds of miles across an international border to pay homage to the Messiah, and the value of the gifts they brought indicates how thankful they were for him. They remind us that living a godly life often involves risk, and also that prayer, Bible study, worship, and financial support of the Church may not be easy or convenient, but the same Lord who was worthy of the sacrifice the Magi made is worthy of our sacrifice of time, treasure, and energy. We do well to wonder what is the "star" that God used to call each of us? Perhaps it was Scripture, but more typically it is someone whom God has used in order to reach us: a parent, a family member, a friend, a priest, a religious sister, or a devoted lay person. Who are the stars in your life through whom God called you? (to be continued)
