# FROM THE PASTOR 2018 THE JOURNEY WITH THE MAGI (Part 3)



Wise Men Follow the Star

"I see him, but not now; I behold him, but not near. A star will come out of Jacob; a scepter will rise out of Israel"
(Numbers 24:17)

In one sense, the prophecy from the book of numbers applies to Israel itself, particularly with reference to David's conquest of the Moabites (2 Samuel 8:2). However, the concept of the scepter, a symbol of kingship, refers not only to David, but to David's greater Son, and refers back to Genesis: "The scepter shall not depart from Judah, nor a lawgiver from between his feet, until Shiloh comes; and to Him shall be the obedience of the people. (Genesis 49:10). This passage from Genesis refers to the coming Messiah, to be descended from Judah, so by inference, it has been suggested by theologians that Numbers 24:17 also refers to the coming Messiah. When the wise men finally saw this sign, they dropped everything. The possibility that this was a Divine moment captivated them and they followed. This journey wasn't a light overnight. This had to have taken months. Like any long trip, it took planning. It took a whole lot of money to outfit a caravan, to employ guards, to buy provisions and places to stay along the way. But their commitment to find where God was showing up caused them to reorganize their whole lives. Their time, their comfort, their money-all of it was tied up in finding Jesus. They could have noted the appearance of the star in their log books, indicated their conviction that this phenomenon probably signaled something or someone very special, and then gone about their business. But no. They put commitment to their conviction, feet to their faith, and commenced a journey (which was no doubt difficult and dangerous at times) all because they knew, at the end, they would finally meet the new King. When God presents us with some new opportunity, are we willing to get up off our rustydusty and begin a journey of faith? The story of the Wise Men says there is something special that awaits at the finish. One of the things that has intrigued me about this story is the incredible wrong turn these folks took as they neared the end of their trip. Instead of following the star to Bethlehem, they stopped off in Jerusalem to ask directions of Herod. Who is helping you in case of doubt about your faith? Do you have the humility to ask for help?

The wise men knew that this was not just any star. It was His star — that is, the star of the Messiah. This also indicates that they knew the prophecies in Numbers 24 and Genesis 49.for they said, "We have seen His star." The star belonged to Jesus. The faithful Christian, like the star, belongs to Jesus. Every beam in that star shown forth for Jesus. It was His star. It is well for us to forget ourselves in the person of Christ so that our every movement, our every action, shines forth Christ. You may be a very little star twinkling for Jesus. However feeble your light may be, let it be plain that you are His star. People may wonder who you are, but they should never wonder whose you are. Each one of us is meant to be the star that leads people to Jesus and must always be going toward Christ. Souls are much better led to Christ by example than driven by exhortation. It is a small thing to shine for Jesus, but it is a great thing to lead people to Jesus. Our mission is not complete until we bring others face to face with the living Christ. When the star came to where Jesus was, it stood still and just as our minds should become settled and fixed and focused in upon Jesus. Never indulge your mind in things so sublime outside Jesus for there is no deeper spirituality than is to be found in Christ. We will do well to live Christ-like lives so that when we ultimately die people will find us still shining for Jesus and pointing to the place where the Savior may be found. What you believe should determine how you behave. Be willing to put feet on your faith, and then get going and follow the star. (to be continued--).
