FROM THE PASTOR 2018 THE JOURNEY WITH THE MAGI (Part 4)



"Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and do not lean on your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make straight your paths." (Prov. 3: 5-6)

This journey of the Magi was a massive step of faith. They had some ancient scripture (that wasn't even from their own tradition). They had this strange light in the sky. But they had no guarantees. They had no address, no GPS to get them safely where they had to go. There was no promise that they would find anything after all their effort. The wise men simply had hope that the words of scripture were true, that they could make the long journey safely, and that they would get to see this baby king. That's the very definition of faith. Trusting God's leading without guarantees, trusting so much that you step out and you follow. It was also true of them as it was said about Abraham: "Against all hope, Abraham in hope believed and so became the father of many nations, just as it had been said to him, "So shall your offspring be." (Rm. 4:18).

We are aware that as Christians, never have we been promised an easy life; we are still supposed to trust God, knowing that He may lead us into hardships. Sometimes it feels like you are standing at the top of a cliff, fearfully putting your trust in someone who may well push you off, against your wishes and with no warning. I remember wrestling with this during one of my most unwell times. "How can I trust someone who may allow me to go even deeper into this pit of suffering?" It's a very real question. If I can't trust a God who loves me to protect me from what I fear most, then what can I trust Him for? Sometimes I think we forget what it means to be a Christian. It means that we've been crucified with Christ. Crucified! We have given up all of our earthly rights in the hope that we can be restored to relationship with God; that we have a home in heaven; and that all things will, ultimately, work together for our good. We do not chiefly trust in God to make our lives easier. We surrender our lives, to share in His sufferings, because we believe it is the greatest possible trade we could make. Our trust is in God, not for earthly pleasures, but for the glory that will one day be revealed. Too many times we tell ourselves to wait for the perfect conditions before we take up a challenging journey. But there will never be perfect conditions. We will never have enough money, the perfect companion or the perfect job. We will never have enough to perfectly attack the challenge because that is not what is needed in order to prevail. God often is not trying to change your circumstances. He wants to change your heart. Once you trust God, then it is the Lord that is solving the problem for you. Your future is not determined by your circumstances or defined by your past; it is based on your potential and faith in God. God is willing to work for you, if you are willing to work for God. But working for God begins at home. You have to prepare yourself in God's ways first. It also requires risk and obedience to God. But ultimately, trusting God allows Him to create a miracle out of your mess. No matter what you're going to face this next week, you're not going to face it alone. God is with you, he is in you, and he is for you and his answers are at that spot where the STAR stops. (To be continued-).
