LOW GLUTEN COMMUNION

Holy Comforter offers low gluten altar bread produced by **Cavanagh Company** in Greenville, RI.

These wafers are approved for use in the Catholic Mass by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops. They are made of wheat starch and water. The gluten content of their low gluten wafer is below 20 parts per million. The baking of the low gluten wafers is done in a dedicated bakery using positive air pressure to create a room that is totally free of contaminants. The equipment is also dedicated to the low gluten baking and is not used for regular altar bread production. They are packaged in boxes of 25 individually wrapped wafers to prevent cross contamination in transit and while stored.

IT TAKES FIFTY DAYS TO CELEBRATE EASTER (part 2)



Then the eleven disciples went away into Galilee, to the mountain which Jesus had appointed for them. When they saw Him, they worshiped Him; but some doubted (Mt. 28:16-17).

Following His Resurrection from the dead, Jesus made a number of appearances to his followers—no less than ten of these are recorded in Scripture. Beginning on Resurrection Sunday, He "showed himself alive... by many infallible proofs" (Acts 1:3). And He instructed His apostles and many other followers periodically for forty days. He then ascended from Mount Olivet, near Jerusalem, while the apostles watched (Acts 1:9-12).

The fact that in Matthew's account "some doubted" is at first glance a problem, but it seems to indicate only a preliminary reaction as to whether or not this was indeed Jesus, not doubt concerning His resurrection. This doubt was soon dispelled, as Jesus spoke saying, "All power is given unto me in heaven and in earth. Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, Io, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world. Amen" (Mt 28:18-20). Only Jesus could speak such words, and it must have brought reassuring faith to all who were there.

Though the doctrine of the resurrection is the foundation of all other Catholic doctrines, it was not easy for the Apostles to believe right away that the Master was alive. Maybe, they only saw a ghost, not the resurrected Lord. The truth is that it is very difficult to prove the resurrection of our Lord because seeing the Risen Lord is something beyond human imagination and expectation. It is too difficult to believe it is true. For the women themselves, who went to the tomb early in the morning, when they encountered the Risen Lord, they were filled with awe and amazement. Most of all, they were filled with a joy beyond description. For this reason, we can understand why today many people in the world still do not believe in the resurrection of our Lord. This should not be surprising. Since they have not seen the Risen Lord, why should they believe? Only those who are ready to accept the power of God's intervention can be more receptive to the possibility of the resurrection. This was how St. Peter tried to show the logic of their belief in the resurrection of our Lord. St. Peter made it clear that the passion and death of Christ, although carried out by sinful and ignorant men, was within the plan of God (Acts 3). The death of Jesus was not contrary to His divine plan. In fact, what he said was not new because Christ revealed to them the plan of God when He explained to the disciples at Emmaus; "Oh, how foolish you are, and how slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have declared! Was it not necessary that the Messiah should suffer these things and then enter into his glory?' (Lk. 24:25-26). But we know that the resurrection is real because of the transformation of life. Even if you do not believe that Jesus is raised, we can see from the effects in the outpouring of the Holy Spirit; even if the resurrection cannot be proven, the testimony is credible.

Let us then live the resurrected life of love, freedom from all fear and anxiety, to take one day at a time knowing that the Lord will show us the way; knowing that He holds tomorrow and He holds our hands. **ALLELUIA.**
