#### FROM THE PASTOR:

# CELEBRATING CHRIST IN THE ORDINARY TIME (Continued--)

One spiritual writer said; "There's nothing ordinary about Ordinary Time, just a time set aside for reflecting on and celebrating our call to follow Jesus day by day"

Last week I left with some hanging questions and promised to offer some suggestions on: How can I remain "ever green" during this Ordinary Time? And how can I be more productive in the Lord's vineyard for the glory of God?

To remain "ever green" first of all; make yourself available for Christ by meeting him in the sacred scriptures. The four gospels in the New Testament, as well as the entirety of the books of Sacred Scripture, are available to our generation like never before. The cycles of readings for Sunday and daily Masses provide the opportunity to hear nearly all the Word proclaimed in a liturgical setting. The printed texts of the bible are available to most of the literate world. They need to be read, not just with an academic approach, but also devotionally—prayerfully. We have to keep in mind that there is nothing we can do to be saved or to progress in the spiritual life except by Christ. Begin each new day by surrendering yourself to Him and His Will. Replace the habit of pride with the practice of humility, trusting in the Lord.

Secondly; *Enter into and Remain in a State of Grace.* Among all the gifts of God, my beloved, sanctifying grace is the first and the most important, because through it the Christian attains to the highest dignity which a mortal is capable of attaining. We can make no progress in the spiritual life if we are not in a state of sanctifying grace. Those who believed and were baptized were freed of sin and its eternal punishment. They were justified by Christ's grace and said to be in a state of sanctifying grace. If they have not knowingly and freely committed a mortal sin, they remain so. If you are not in a state of sanctifying grace, you need to be. If you are not baptized, seek to be baptized in the Catholic Church. If you are baptized, but have committed a mortal sin, that sin needs to be confessed in the Sacrament of Reconciliation. The words of Holy Scripture may be applied to sanctifying grace: "Now all good things came to me, together with her, and innumerable riches through her hands" (Wis. 7: 11). A soul that is adorned with sanctifying grace stands in greater honor and wealth than the queens of this earth. It possesses a treasure which surpasses the treasures of this earth, for these are transitory, while it is Divine and eternal. With it reigns in the soul the peace and joy and justice of the Holy Spirit, and a foretaste of future happiness in the dwelling place of the Saints.

Thirdly; develop a daily prayer habit Jesus said, "Abide in me and you will bear much fruit" (John 15:5). But what does it mean to abide in Christ? To abide is to remain. It's to stay connected like the branch to the vine. We remain connected to Christ in prayer, trust, dependence, and worship — in our thoughts as much as possible and in the deep attitude of our heart, most of which is unconscious to us at any given time. If we love someone, we desire to be with that person. The same is true if we love God. Prayer is how we spend time with God. Commit to pray daily prayers of Adoration, Petition, Intercession, Thanksgiving and Praise. Devotionals, such as the Rosary, and liturgy, such as the Divine Office, are great practices to assist you.
