

Dear Parishioners of Holy Comforter,

I am grateful to Fr. Joseph Mary and the search committee for the invitation to be the Coordinator of Religious Education at Holy Comforter, and thrilled to have the opportunity to serve you. By way of introduction, I thought it might be helpful to give you a little background about me. Although I have never married, I am blessed to be the mother of my 25 year old son Sergei, who I adopted from Russia when he was 3 years old. I grew up in a little town south of Pittsburgh, PA called Monongahela, the oldest of 4 girls. I attended Indiana University of PA where I received a BA in Special Education. I later earned a Masters in Special Education at Western Maryland College and a Masters in Administration and Supervision at Johns Hopkins University. After teaching for 12 years in special education, I moved to Virginia where I worked at the Kluge Children's Rehabilitation Center as an educational consultant. For the past 15 years, I have been a teacher and Assistant Principal at Charlottesville Catholic School, from which I will be retiring in late June. Alongside my professional career, I have been involved in religious education programs for many years, including at my parish in Pennsylvania, at St. Johns Parish in Waynesboro, and at Incarnation Parish here in Charlottesville, doing everything from teaching RE to assisting with Confirmation, to adult faith formation.

As I was discerning the decision to retire from Charlottesville Catholic School, I felt that the Lord was calling me to a new ministry of service. I've been deeply touched by Pope Francis's call for the "New Evangelization" and I hope that I can help in that endeavor at Holy Comforter as your Coordinator of Religious Education. While the Church tells is that "parents are the primary educators of their children," it is important that families experience Christian Formation as a joint effort of parents, children, and the Church. From the Pastor

IT IS LENT AGAIN

February10th.2016 will be Ash Wednesday. Ash Wednesday is one of the most popular and important holy days in the liturgical calendar. It opens the season of Lent, a time of intensive prayer and exercising some discipline. I grew up knowing that; for every disciplined effort there is a multiple reward. So during this Lenten period there are some expectations in that whatever spiritual exercises we take on there will be accruing rewards.

It isn't enough to slide through Lent just observing the fast and abstinence laws or giving up chocolate. We should all undertake a Lenten program, an inward cleansing and purification, for oneself and the family. The program needs to be planned and organized. Ask the question: **What shall I and my family do this year for Lent?** Goals and activities should be realistic and reasonable, and parents should make sure that their children know why these practices are being adopted, rather than merely forcing them upon them.

After deciding our goals, both individual and as a family, we need to arrange our schedules, plan the different events and make adjustments to our life to put these resolutions into practice. Our daily life doesn't stop just because Lent is here. The challenge is to observe the spirit of Lent and perform the works of Lent while living in a secular culture, to remain in the world but not become a product of it.

Lenten practices begins with the wearing of ashes on the head on Ash Wednesday. The ashes symbolize the dust from which God made us. As the priest applies the ashes to a person's forehead, he speaks the words: "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." Alternatively, the priest may speak the words, "Repent and believe in the Gospel."

Ashes also symbolize grief, in this case, grief that we have sinned and caused division within the family of God. Separating ourselves from God and one another, creating hostility with God and with one another by our sins.

It is important to remember that Ash Wednesday is a day of penitential prayer and fasting. Some faithful take the rest of the day off work and remain home. It is generally inappropriate to dine out, to shop, or to go about in public after receiving the ashes. Feasting is highly inappropriate on Ash Wednesday, and should be minimized during the entire season of lent. Small children, the elderly and sick are exempt from fast observance during this season.

It is not required that a person wears the ashes for the rest of the day of Ash Wednesday, ashes may be washed off after Mass. However, many people keep the ashes as a reminder until the evening.

Recently, movements have developed that involve pastors distributing ashes to passersby in public places. This isn't considered taboo, but Catholics should know such a kind of practice is distinctly Protestant. Catholics should still receive ashes within the context of Mass. In some cases, ashes may be delivered by a priest or a family member to those who are sick or shut-in. Let us taken this journey with determination with expectant joy of becoming closer to God as we experience his MERCY.
