From the Pastor

IT IS LENT AGAIN

Lent is a time to free our souls from detrimental sin so we can do good works; just as a farmer removes weeds so that the garden can yield the desired fruits. However, while Lent is a time of "rejuvenation and resurrection," I would like to discuss the suffering which is implicit in the hope of the resurrection, the aspect of **SELF-DENIAL**.

Canon 1249 of the Church law states- "all members of the Christian faithful in their own way are bound to do penance in virtue of divine law; in order that all may be joined in a common observance of penance, penitential days are prescribed in which the Christian faithful in a special way pray, exercise works of piety and charity, and deny themselves by fulfilling their responsibilities more faithfully and especially by observing fast and abstinence according to the norm of the following canons.

Canon 1250 — All Fridays through the year and the time of Lent are penitential days and times throughout the universal Church. This canon is taken from Poenitemini, part III.

Canon 1251 — Abstinence from eating meat or another food according to the prescriptions of the conference of bishops is to be observed on Fridays throughout the year unless they are solemnities; abstinence and fast are to be observed on Ash Wednesday and on the Friday of the Passion and Death of Our Lord Jesus Christ.

The following quote also serves to make the point that the observance of Lent is not optional for members of the Roman Catholic Church.

In 1966 Pope Paul VI reorganized the Church's practice of public penance in his "Apostolic Constitution on Penance." The 1983 revision of the Code of Canon Law incorporated the changes made by Pope Paul. Not long after that, the U.S. bishops applied the canonical requirements to the practice of public penance in our country. To sum up those requirements, Catholics between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. In addition, all Catholics 14 years old and older must abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and all the Fridays of Lent.

For the love of the Lord, self-denial during and after Lent is not a burden for us. The season of Lent compares Christ's forty days of fasting in the desert as told by Matthew (4:1-11), Mark (1:12-13), and Luke (4:1-13) with our observance of Lent as 40days. Note that Jesus does not begin his ministry until he has purified himself in the desert through self-denial and suffering. Let us think of this as the spiritual weight-lifting before the big spiritual race. The lesson here is that we cannot become good Catholics without the proper formation. When we become spiritually strong we can go out and flex our spiritual muscles in the sense that we have the strong fortitude to endure life's temptations, and have the strength to share the fruits of our self-denial with others.

It is only through the suffering of self-denial that we realize we can do nothing without Him. As part of my own Lenten observance I am reading <u>Searching for and Maintaining Peace</u>. In it, Fr. Philippe writes that we must learn to let go in order to receive God. Sounds a lot like the meaning of Lent does it not? We must let go of our sin, let go of our worries, and let go of our wants. By releasing ourselves from our own individual concerns we have the space needed to accept God's grace. The self-imposed questions are no longer "What do I think is true?" but "What is the truth?" The question is not, "What is it that I want out of life?" but "What is God's vocation for me?" By letting go of ourselves we cling on to God. But, this leap takes great faith, it involves much suffering and a strong will. Christ's agony in the garden, the ultimate moment of human suffering, only purified his heart all the more so he could freely give himself over to the Father's will.

Let us allow our Lenten suffering bond us closer to Him who is our satisfaction and embrace self-denial. One spiritual writer noted: "suffering [self-denial] is the process of purification by which alone man is in most cases sanctified." If we freely deny ourselves temporal concerns, then we are left no choice but to concern ourselves with the Eternal.
