Evidence exists from the Middle Ages that strings of beads were used to count Our Fathers and Hail Mary's. Actually, these strings of beads became known as "Paternosters," the Latin for "Our Father.

From the Pastor

IT IS LENT AGAIN (part 4)

"Everyone who competes in the games goes into strict training. They do it to get a crown that will not last, but we do it to get a crown that will last forever" (1 Corinthian 9:25).

Lent helps us to become more focused on Jesus' path to gaining victory for the glory of God the Father, which implies following Him more closely. Following Christ implies great confidence in Him. It implies self-renunciation. A man must renounce himself, before he will follow Christ. Christ pleased not Himself, he sought not his own glory, but the glory of Him that sent Him, hence, let no man think that he follows Christ, until he has renounced himself. It implies a trust in Him for the supply of all our wants. It is the giving up of our own interest as the object of pursuit, and devoting ourselves to the glory of God and the good of His people; cheerfully and confidently leaving our own good and all our interests to be provided for and disposed of by Him. Following Christ, then, implies the death of selfishness, it implies not merely and negatively the death of selfishness, but also true holiness of heart and life; or a supreme, disinterested benevolence to God, and equal benevolence to all children of God. It implies the final forsaking of all else for his sake--the everlasting renunciation of all ways, ends, employments, and things, inconsistent with the glory of God and the highest good of men, from truly disinterested love to Him and to the souls of men. Even Christ pleased not Himself: He bore the reproaches, with which men reproached and dishonored God, so patiently, that He might glorify God and save man. So daily following Christ implies, that it is not a mere experiment, for a day, or a month, but a daily continuous journey into eternity.

Before we can know how to please our neighbor, self-denial must first exercise itself in our own personal life. It must rule the body. The holy fasting of Him who said, Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every word that proceeds out of the mouth of God; and who would not eat until His Father gave Him food, and His Father's work was done, teaches us His followers a holy temperance in eating and drinking. The holy poverty of Him who had not where to lay His head, teaches me to regulate the possessions, and use, and enjoyment of earthly things that I may always possess as not possessing. After the example of the holy suffering of Him who bore all our sins in His own body on the tree, I learn to bear all suffering patiently: even in the body as the temple of the Holy Spirit, I desires to bear about the dying of the Lord Jesus; with Paul he keeps under the body and brings it into subjection; all its desires and appetites he would have ruled by the self-denial of Jesus. Yes he did not please himself.

Let no one hope for salvation who does not live a life of daily self-denial. Observe what Christ says: "If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross daily, and follow me." It is not sufficient then to practice occasional self-denial. Self must be set aside and crucified, and denied daily and continually. My happiness must consist in disinterested endeavors to make others happy, or never can I be saved. We have to understand that denying myself daily, taking up my cross daily, and following Christ daily, are indispensable conditions of salvation. And the doing of this daily is as indispensable as doing it at all. Observe, Christ does not say, if any man will come after me, let him deny himself occasionally; take up the cross occasionally; and occasionally, in seasons of special excitement and revival follow me; but the doing of these things daily is here made an indispensable condition of salvation.
