MEDJUGORJE ROSARY PRAYER GROUP

History of the Rosary by Fr. William Saunders

Part 4 - Tradition does hold that St. Dominic (d. 1221) devised the rosary as we know it. Moved by a vision of our Blessed Mother, he preached the use of the rosary in his missionary work among the Albigensians, who had denied the mystery of Christ. Some scholars take exception to St. Dominic's role in forming the rosary. The earliest accounts of his life do not mention it, the Dominican constitutions do not link him with it and contemporaneous portraits do not include it as a symbol to identify the saint.

In 1922, Dom Louis Cougaud stated, "The various elements which enter into the composition of that Catholic devotion commonly called the rosary are the product of a long and gradual development which began before St. Dominic's time, which continued without his having any share in it, and which only attained its final shape several centuries after his death." However, other scholars would rebut that St. Dominic not so much "invented" the rosary as he preached its use to convert sinners and those who had strayed from the faith. Moreover, at least a dozen popes have mentioned St. Dominic's connection with the rosary, sanctioning his role as at least a "pious belief."

From the Pastor

ALLELUIA THE TOMB IS EMPTY (# 1)

"And if Christ has not been raised, then our preaching is vain, your faith also is vain." And those who have died in Christ have perished.

In most cases when something is said to be empty there is usually a negative connotation for instance, "my fuel tank is empty, the wine bottle is empty, the treasury is empty," etc. On the day of the Resurrection of Jesus, however the word EMPTY takes up a triumphant and victorious character.

When very early in the morning on the first day of the week some women went to the tomb with spices to anoint the body of Jesus they found the stone used to close the tomb had been rolled away and going in they found the tomb empty. They were confused and disappointed, but two angels on the ground told them that the one they seek is alive and not among the dead; thus, the empty tomb is, after all, a wonderful indication that the Lord has risen to life.

From the event above we understand emptiness from a different perspective. It speaks of a plus instead of a minus situation. In fact there is more to it than the absence of our Lord Jesus Christ from the tomb. When humanity failed in Adam we became empty by losing our connection with God. To beget our redemption Jesus Christ emptied himself of his equality with God and took our human form (Phil.2:7-8). This he did so that we can be refilled. The tomb became empty so that our lives may be filled with the power of the risen Lord.

Furthermore the emptiness of the tomb is an indication of the futility of life without Jesus Christ. When Jesus Christ is absent from any segment of our lives we stagger in hopeless and senseless emptiness. Attentive to this the preacher said "vanity upon vanity; all is vanity," (Eccles. 1:2). The empty tomb is also an indication of the futility of the power of the devil. It shows that the promises of the devil are but empty promises (Luke 4:3-13). By his resurrection Jesus emptied our lives of sin and evil and filled us with good things (Psalm 107:9; Rom.15:13).

Arguments for and against the empty tomb had preoccupied biblical scholars for a long time. It makes no sense to me to go into all of such arguments and there is no room for it because the joy of the risen Lord so much fills our mind and heart that there may not be any room for such baseless arguments.

It will be more profitable to explore what actually happened between the time of the burial of Jesus Christ and his resurrection on the third day. When Jesus died his body was buried in the tomb but his spirit descended into hell (as we proclaim in the creed: **"He descended into hell.**") The hell referred to in this passage is not the lake of fire described in the book of Revelation (20:14). Hell as used here refers to hades which in Greek means a place of the dead. We see this very clearly in the book of Revelation (20:12) which tells us the dead would first be judged before their fate is determined. St. Paul in his letter to the Ephesians (4:8-10) tells us what this descending into hell means and St. Peter supports his view (I Pet.3:19) by telling us that he descended into hell to preach to the souls there, and to share with them the good news of the new heaven and of the new earth.

Jesus the Lord of the living and the dead stands triumphantly between heaven and earth to make a point that even death cannot release anyone from the authority of God's Son. He is Lord of both the living and the dead. As people of faith we hold on to the view that people must decide to either yield or rebel against Him, but they have the opportunity to make this choice only while they are still living. Now that Lent is over, have you recommitted yourself to Christ's rule over your life? His authority causes anger or fear in individuals who have not yet yielded to Him, but those who have experienced His loving kindness, trusted in His goodness, and surrendered to His authority, take comfort in his real living presence in the Eucharist, and know Him as the Lord who is full of compassion and mercy, who instills in those who love and serve him, the same character as His, to rise from the dead. Alleluia praise the Lord. Can you name your EMPTY TOMB?
