FROM THE PASTOR
JUNE: FOR LOVE AND MERCY.



“And I, if I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all men to Myself.” (Jn. 12:32)

The crucifix is a characteristically a Catholic icon. Although other Christians fondly and proudly display the cross, it is the crucifix that is largely unique to the Catholics. Why is the symbol of the death of Christ so important to Catholics?

Many Protestants condemn the Catholics for having the image of Jesus on the cross. *“Oh we don’t like that ‘it’s an empty cross, Jesus arose and lives”*. Perhaps it could be a grave error in cleaning up the cross. The reality is a bloody mutilated Savior did hang on the cross. In some of the Catholic churches you get the view of Jesus really suffering and dying for us, we see the crown of thorns and a glimpse of His agony. One preacher told me that we must be careful not to create a Jesus like a successful business man that won ‘salesperson of the year’. Or a Jesus like a super sports hero who always wins! No. The real Man Jesus carried a real Cross, shed real blood, suffered in a real body, and his real dead body was taken down and buried in a tomb. Jesus sweat real drops of blood in the garden the night before He was crucified. He prayed to the Father *“if it is possible let this cup pass from me, nevertheless, not my will but Thy will be done!”* Within hours a scourged, bloody and tortured Jesus is carrying a Cross toward Calvary. No beautiful cross there, No-one saying ‘this cross would look good on you!’ Horror of horrors—how could we, even worse how do we? At that Cross no cheering crowds, no wild praise, no long cheer of applause only jeers, mockery, curses, nails, blood and a cross as the Son of God bought our souls with his life!

The fact that Christ suffered and expired in the worst way imaginable serves as a lesson that our sins are no small thing. Indeed, the moment we take our eyes off the crucified Savior we tend to convey the message that our salvation came so easily! Our salvation is the result of a willing sacrifice by the very Son of God Himself who chose the ordeal of the cross because He so loved the people of God.

As Catholics, we celebrate the entire ministry of Christ at every single Mass, with special emphasis on the Last Supper, the crucifixion and resurrection of Christ. The Liturgy of the Word covers begins with an Old Testament reading accompanies with a Psalm. Then, a reading from the New Testament, often from one of the many letters of the apostles is shared. Finally, a selected Gospel passage is read which shares with parishioners a teaching from Christ Himself. After the Liturgy of the Word, we enjoy the Liturgy of the Eucharist which involves the reenactment of the Last Supper, a meal to which we are all called to eat the Body of Christ and to drink the Blood of Christ, shed for us that sins may be forgiven.

St. Paul also make it very clear to the early Christians that the crucifixion itself was integral to the Christian devotion. St. Paul mentioned the fact that Christ died for us all (2 Cor 5:14). In the First Letter of Paul to the Corinthians, he mentioned that he preached about "Christ crucified," (1 Cor 2:2) to drive home the importance of the deed of the crucifixion itself.

So the crucifix represents among other things, our level of commitment to Christ. Yes, we believe in and trust what comes after the cross. We believe in the Resurrection and that we too will be with Christ in heaven one day. However, on Earth we must make sacrifices to serve our God, our family, our neighbor and our nation and the crucifix keep on reminding us of that commitment. The crucifix represents our pledge to live fully as Christians, and our wiliness to make all sacrifices required to fulfill the vocations to which God calls each man, woman and child. *(To be continued).*
