FROM THE PASTOR: THE VALUE OF THE CRUCIFIX



"We adore Thee, O Christ, and we bless Thee: because by Thy Holy Cross Thou hast redeemed the world."

"In the struggle for life, talking about God is indispensable. Only in this way does the value of the weak, the disabled, the non-productive, the incurably ill become apparent; only in this way can we relearn and rediscover, too, the value of suffering: the greatest lesson on human dignity always remains the cross of Christ. Our salvation has its origins not in what the Son of God did but in [H]is suffering, and whoever does not know how to suffer does not know how to live" (Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI).

The cross in the New Testament seem to have a more personal and individual meaning as a symbol or an image for the path of transformation, for what it means to follow Jesus. It means to die and rise with Christ. We find this in Paul. "I have been crucified with Christ. It is no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me. (Gal.2:20). In the cross there is an image for that path of spiritual and psychological transformation that leads to a new identity and way of being.

After the dark-days of Poland (1939), we read that Polish Catholics, mindful of the horrors of the death camps, did what was of no surprise to Catholics around the world. They fashioned what was for them a symbol of divine presence, in this case a convent where women would pray in reparation for the horrors that had happened on that soil; outside the convent, they erected a twenty-three foot cross. Their actions were in one sense typically Catholic. Raise a cross? It probably never entered into the minds of the builders to do otherwise.

Atonement is the Christian doctrine of the cross -- Why did Jesus die? What did his death accomplish? There are a lot of versions of the atonement doctrine in Christian history....The "substitutionary blood sacrifice" version of the atonement is the least compelling theological explanation of the cross for a number of people. For me, the suffering of Jesus is a sacrament of the love of God. The story tells us that God willingly soaks up all of our systemic injustice, personal evil and violence and returns only love. The predominant philosophy of Jesus is compassion, compassion beyond words. Jesus reveals a God whose love for us is deep and womb-like, like the love a mother has for the child of her womb. What we understand in the crucifix is God with us (Emmanuel) on earth in our horror, our terror, our violence, and our suffering. God refuses to add to the evil and violence, but instead responds with vulnerable, compassionate love. That's how God wins. The resurrection of Jesus proclaims that love is more powerful than hate, compassion triumphs over oppression, and vulnerability overcomes power. Jesus invites us to put our trust in God, even in the face of horror, oppression, cruelty and death. God is with us. God feels and suffers deeply with us. And, what God does best is to bring life out of death.

Ultimately, the value of life is found in the Cross of Christ. The dignity of the unborn, the dignity of family life, the dignity of chastity, the dignity of the elderly, is rooted in the suffering Christ. Only in His wounds will we find strength to carry our crosses and to see our intrinsic value. (To be continued---).
