

"By the grace of God I am what I am, and His grace toward me was not in vain." (1Cr. 15: 10)

At the beginning of this Ordinary Time of the Church calendar, I look at ourselves as greatly graced and equipped by Christ's birth to live our sacramental life in a more profound way. The color and the times of this season fit so well with that which is natural. During this Ordinary Time until Lent, I will explore how we can expect to live out the sacramental life of the Church and how we can benefit from the blessings of the Incarnate Word of God.

Green is the color of Ordinary Time in the life of the church, and the color of nature during its season of growth. The Offering is a joyful celebration of God's marvelous gifts, including the green earth and the home and nourishment it provides. In the Offering, we respond to God's generosity with our own gifts so that the ministry carried on in God's name will grow and flourish.

Ordinary Time lasts from Pentecost all the way until the First Sunday of Advent when the story begins all over again. It's the longest season of the church calendar. In Ordinary Time the incarnate and risen Christ is now present in the world in a different way: the Spirit dwells in the believer and empowers the church to engage in God's redemptive mission in the world. We reveal his light, we exhibit his life, and we embody his love. During Ordinary Time, we are empowered to live out all the blessings the Incarnate Son of God has given us and we move on and act in his name.

What we know is that Sacraments are sacred signs. They show Christ's presence in all the key moments of life: birth; death; coming-of-age; community leadership; the most basic relationships of family; our daily struggle to love better; and in the Eucharist, our daily life in communion with the God we worship.

The Sacraments confer grace. They penetrate us with the life of Christ. But it would be too little to think that grace comes only "after" we receive them. It is grace that draws us toward them, grace that leads one to ask for Baptism, grace that leads the sinner to repent and go to Confession, grace that makes us long for the Eucharist, divine, sanctifying, transforming grace that leads us to consecrate our lives in marriage or the priesthood. Grace does not leave us as we were before; grace makes us want to do something, to come to Jesus. Grace makes us want to express our new life through the Sacraments. All of our life, the Holy Spirit is driving us to the Sacraments.
