

FROM THE PASTOR EQUIPPED WITH THE BLESSINGS FROM CHRIST (3)



"By the grace of God I am what I am, and His grace toward me was not in vain." (1Cr. 15: 10)

The Second Vatican Council, Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy says: "Christ is always present to his Church, especially in the actions of the liturgy. He is present in the sacrifice of the Mass, in the person of the minister (*it is the same Christ who formerly offered himself on the cross that now offers by the ministry of priests*) and most of all under the Eucharistic species. He is present in the SACRAMENTS by his power, in such a way that when someone baptizes, Christ himself baptizes. He is present in His Word, for it is He himself who speaks when the holy Scriptures are read in the Church. Finally, He is present when the Church prays and sings, for He himself promised: *Where two or three are gathered in my name, l am there in their midst."*

The life of Christ received through the Sacraments is real, as the Vatican II document has stated. However it is important to know that a Sacrament is not some form of magic or technique; it always operates only by and through Divine Grace and can in no way be manipulated by men for their own self-centered purposes. This Grace is most evident in our lives in these Holy Mysteries, which are the continuing, operative form of the act of redemption. It is in the nature of a Sacrament always to have visible form. There is no such thing as a "purely spiritual" Mystery; there is always a concrete, visible manifestation of sacramental grace. Further, just as there were specific agents of the fall (Adam and Eve) and the Redemption (the Lord Jesus), so also for any Sacrament there is a proper agent or minister. This minister is not just any person, but rather one appointed by Christ (through the Church) as His agent for the purpose. For example, in **Baptism**, the agent is the ordained minister (or in an emergency, a person who can pronounce the words of baptism); in **Confirmation**, the official minister is the Bishop (sometimes he may delegate a priest); Reconciliation, Eucharist and Anointing of the Sick are administered by an ordained priest. In Holy Orders, the Bishop Ordains, and for Matrimony the ministers are the bride and groom with an official witness as an ordained minister of the Catholic Church. It is further necessary that both minister and recipient approach the Sacrament with a proper intent; God does not impose His grace upon us regardless, in spite of ourselves. Rather, He grants us ordinary and reliable means in the Sacraments whereby we may turn to Him for the Grace and energy needed for leading the life to which He calls us.

To live the life of the Sacraments is always to be running to Christ, and to know that it is Christ himself who has given you the grace to run to him. St. Patrick said, **"Christ before me, Christ behind me."** It is important to point out that **at the heart of the sacraments is the Eucharist.** They all revolve around the Eucharist as around the sun. We receive Christ in communion. On the one hand, our life is profoundly united to him. He comes to dwell in us, and draws us to dwell in him. Our whole life is consecrated by union with Jesus. With him in the person of the ordained priest we offer a worthy sacrifice to our heavenly Father. Christ is the victim, the sign we offer of how precious the Father is to us. He is the altar, upon which we offer ourselves. By joining our worship to His, we not only accept Him as the perfect worship, but say that we want to give our life as fully to the Father as He did. **"To live the sacramental life is to be all Eucharistic,"** as one theologian said. It is to love this sign, this culmination and fulfillment, this source and summit of our perfect prayer and perfect self-offering in love that the graces received in the Sacraments is realized.
