POPE FRANCIS' 10 SECRETS TO HAPPINESS

We all want to be happy, and in our world today there are many people telling us how to achieve that goal. Yet, many of these paths to happiness are based on false promises or superficial suggestions that offer fleeting moments of pleasure and quickly fade away. The Cost to Follow Christ

³⁷ "Whoever loves father or mother more than me is not worthy of me, and whoever loves son or daughter more than me is not worthy of me;³⁸ and whoever does not take up his cross and follow after me is not worthy of me.³⁹Whoever finds his life will lose it, and whoever loses his life for my sake will find it."

We are asked to ponder these words of the Gospel today. What is Jesus asking of us? How can I lose my life to find it? The question really is, where is my life centered; where is my "first love?" Jesus says that in order to follow him, we must love him even more than we love our parents and our children. How can we do that? Only by participating in the death and resurrection of Christ, and then living as Jesus lived. Paul speaks of this in the second reading from Romans: "If we have died with Christ, we shall also live with him.....we know that Christ, raised from the dead, dies no more;......you too must think of yourselves as dead to sin and living for God in Christ Jesus." The Good News is that by virtue of our Baptism, we have indeed been born to new life; we have died with Christ and live with him!

How then are we to live this new life that we have been given in Christ? By loving as Jesus first loved us. By giving sacrificially to those in need – a cup of water, a place to stay – whatever it takes! In the first reading, the "woman of influence" illustrates Jesus's point. She receives Elisha the prophet and for her generosity, receives the prophet's reward – the promise that she will have a baby son within the year. New life!

Catholic Bible teacher Kevin Saunders offers this insight:

Jesus demands a loyalty from his disciples that is normally reserved only for family. He announces that they must love him more than they currently love their father and mother. More than they love their son or daughter.

This concept of love is defined uniquely in the Bible. In our modern world, "love" primarily conveys heartfelt emotion. The love Jesus refers to here is expressed in the idea of the attachment family members have for one another. It conveys the meaning of being attached, staying connected with one another. So too the word "hate," used biblically, means to be detached. In Luke's version of our story (<u>Luke 14:25-27</u>), Jesus teaches that his disciples must hate their father and mother. Hate their son and daughter. He means that they will have to be radically committed to him and his vision if they are going to identify with Jesus and his public ministry.

In order to follow Jesus, then, to experience the resurrection in our lives, we must first be completely committed to Him, and through that love to be willing to be so attached to our brothers and sisters that we would sacrifice all that we have for them. In our humanity, that is impossible, but in Christ, such unconditional love can be received and shared. As we have freely received, we can freely give.

So where is my first love? Am I willing to risk it all for Jesus? Will my faith challenge the relationships I have with my family? My friends? My job? How will I have to live differently today so that the people I meet and greet will know that I belong to God, His Church, and the Body of Christ?

We pray for the courage and grace to live our Baptismal promise to line in Christ, share His love, and call others to Him.
