FAST AND ABSTINENCE

(From the United States Conference on Catholic Bishops) Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence for Catholics. In addition, Fridays during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence.

The norms on fasting are obligatory from age 18 until age 59. When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal. The norms concerning abstinence from meat are binding from age 14 onwards.

From The Pastor Lenten Reflection 2018, Part 3 CHOOSE TO SUFFER FROM 'THE FOOLISHNESS OF LOVE'



"By this we know love, that he laid down his life for us." (1 Jn.3:16)

Real love, is shown in a capacity to sacrifice for the one loved, even to the point of laying down one's life. And the Lord himself said; "Greater love has no one than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends." (In. 15:13). Lent is an occasion to show that type of sacrificial love by what we do; sacrifices and self-denial for the sake of the one we love.

Lent is ultimately meant to be a season in which we ponder the incredible, spousal love of Jesus Christ for his Church shown in his dying so that his Bride might live. There's no greater love story in history than that of the true, indeed extreme, love of Christ for us. There's no greater choice we'll ever make than to respond to God's eschatological marriage proposal and align our lives with his nuptial passion.

Lent is a pilgrimage toward Holy Thursday when the marriage between Christ and his Bride is consummated as his Bride takes within His body and blood and becomes one flesh with Him. And then on Good-Friday, the Christ allows himself to be crucified on the cross and becomes the most visible act of God's love towards us. It was in God's plan. It wasn't an accident. I think sometimes people think that Jesus was a man on earth who was kind of like a leaf on a river, who got carried to and fro, and somehow ended up on the cross, got lucky and paid for everyone's sin, or maybe unlucky, depending on how you look at that. That's not actually what it was. Yes, people made choices and decisions that resulted in Christ going to the cross, but the decision made before the world was created was that Christ would go to the cross to pay for sin, so what we see is this act of love on the cross was intentional. As at the first creation of Eve from the rib of the first Adam (Gn. 2:21-22), the New Eve is formed from the pierced side of the New Adam on what St. Edith Stein called the bed of the Cross. This then culminates in the joy of the Easter Vigil, when the prophecy of Isaiah, says, "The One who has become your husband is your Maker. ...The Lord calls you back like a wife!" (Is.54:5). A Lent like this will lead us, on April 1, to an Easter in which we rejoice in the practical joke God has played on death, on sin and on the evil: when even after public crucifixion, the Bridegroom rose triumphantly from death in order to be able to raise us, his Beloved, with Him and prepare us for an eternal wedding banquet after the Lent of earthly life.

We need to value not just what Jesus did at the cross, but what God showed at the cross. As Christians we hopefully understand the cross better than the non-Christian world, but for the non-Christian world I think one of the reasons they can't understand godly, biblically centered love is because they don't understand the cross. So Christians, in a way, have been shown a love, the greatest love, that no one else has yet to know, but this also comes with an obligation. We've been let in on what this greatest love looks like and we've been told to act in light of it towards other people, so there's a greater responsibility in terms of how we love also. Think deeply about how you LOVE. (*To be continued---).*
