

From The Pastor Easter Reflection 2018, Part 3 JESUS IS LOVE, ALLELUIA, HE IS RISEN TO LOVE



"No one can take my life from me. I sacrifice it voluntarily. For I have the authority to lay it down when I want to and also to take it up again. For this is what my Father has commanded." (Jn. 10:18)

I believe we feel more loved when people do good things for us willingly and eagerly and gladly rather than grudgingly or under compulsion. Indeed, in all His ministry and sacrifice for His people, Jesus willingly lays down His life for the people He loves. One composer testifies in a hymn, "Love so amazing so divine, demands my soul, my life, my all!" Jesus willingly gave Himself up to His Father's will that a people be saved from sin, and He volunteered within the Trinity to give Himself as the one and only Saviour from sin. In one of the Psalms we have a prophecy of the Messiah's willingness to come to be Saviour of sinners. "Then I said, "Here I am, I have come—it is written about me in the scroll. I desire to do your will, my God; your law is within my heart." (40:7-8) We need to stop and think what love did to Jesus: Jesus willingly came in the fullness of time, born of a woman, born under the law to redeem those who were under the law, that we might receive the adoption of sons as Paul says it in Galatians 4:4-5. Jesus willingly submitted Himself in all those first 30 years, living in a family setting in that generally despised village of Nazareth. He willingly gave Himself up all too often not being understood or appreciated and not respected. Even Jesus' half-siblings did not esteem Him. He willingly gave Himself over to the labor in the carpenter shop of Joseph. He Who made the universe and all in it with speaking only a word, now willingly toiled with His hands with tools, making this and that for the family business. Never once did Jesus unwillingly do what God perfectly required for Him to accomplish as Saviour of sinners. So Jesus willingly and constantly lived a life of perfect obedience to all God's Ten Commandments in every possible detail, even when it meant for Him, more often than we realize, being despised and ridiculed and isolated by others. And, find these words in the gospel of John; "For this reason the Father loves Me, because I lay down My life that I may take it again." (Jn.10:17) This means that there is a special delight that the Father has for the Son because of his willingness to lay down his life for his people and defeat death on their behalf. But why does Jesus stress the freedom of His love? Because if his death were forced on him, if his heart weren't really in it—then a big question mark would be put over his love for us. The depth of his love is in its freedom. If he didn't die for us willingly—if he didn't choose the suffering and embrace it then how deep is his love really? So he stresses it. He makes it explicit. "No one takes my life from me. I lay it down on my own initiative". It comes out of me, not out of circumstances, not out of pressure, but out of what I really long to do. So here's the point. The resurrection of Jesus is given to us as the confirmation or evidence that he was indeed free in laying down his life. And so the resurrection is Christ's testimony to the freedom of his love for us. The Lord is saying: My resurrection is a shout over my love for my sheep: It was free! It was free! I chose it. I embraced it. Do you love Jesus freely and without strings attached? (to be continued...)
