FAST AND ABSTINENCE

(From the United States Conference on Catholic Bishops) Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence for Catholics. In addition, Fridays during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence.

The norms on fasting are obligatory from age 18 until age 59. When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal. The norms concerning abstinence from meat are binding from age 14 onwards.

FOR MY BENEFIT, MY FAMILY AND MY CHURCH, I WELCOME AND EMBRACE LENT (Part 2)



"The days are coming," declares the LORD, "when I will make a new covenant with the people of Israel and with the people of Judah." (Jer. 31:31)

I believe very often we hear the word "covenant," but do you really know what it means? The covenants of God are the cornerstone of the Bible and yet very few in our churches are familiar with its meaning or its application in our relationship with God. Its basic meaning is an agreement. In scriptural terms, it is an agreement between God and man, initiated by God. God chooses to reach out to man and offer him an agreement. Simply stated, God says, "If you will do this, then I will do that". There are basically six parts common to covenants: The Parties: A covenant is an agreement or treaty between two people or groups of people. The Promises: each party declares his promises to the other party. The Conditions: Each party is responsible to fulfill his promises. If one fails to keep his promise (breaks the covenant), the other is no longer bound to the covenant. The Duration: The length of time that the covenant is binding upon each party. The Sign: Often there is a visual object used as the sign of the covenant. When the parties of the covenant look upon the sign, they are reminded of the covenant. This may be an object or the covenant contract itself. The Dedication: A dedication is performed, often in the form of a ceremony. This often involves the shedding of blood.

God promised that the people of Israel would be his chosen people, and he would be their God (Ex. 6:7). God issued the Ten Commandments and the laws in Leviticus to be obeyed by the Hebrews. If they complied, he pledged prosperity and protection in the Promised Land.

The letter to the Hebrews points out that; "In the past God spoke to our ancestors through the prophets at many times and in various ways, but in these last days he has spoken to us by his Son, whom he appointed heir of all things, and through whom also he made the universe" (Heb.1:1-2). So by and through Jesus Christ the Son of God, a New Covenant was established. The New Covenant promises salvation from sin and eternal life with God. Jesus as the high priest, constantly intercedes for his followers before his Father in heaven.

Both the Old and New Testaments are the story of the same God, a God of love and mercy who gave his people the freedom to choose and who gives his people the opportunity to come back to him by choosing Jesus Christ. The Old Covenant was for a specific people in a specific place and time. The New Covenant extends to the entire world. Jesus is the Savior of the world.

In the Covenant there is a key binding force and that is "Commitment." I am tempted to believe that may be one of the reasons our culture has avoided words such as "covenant" because it is a commitment. Our society today in general does not like commitments. The only commitment that we commit to today is to our own desires and happiness. We will do what is necessary and go wherever is needed to make us happy. The most tragic loss is that we, as a nation, have forgotten the God of the Covenant, who committed Himself to us; the God who created us and gave us life. It is a shame if we present ourselves as a people who no longer serve God and our fellow man. Instead, we serve ourselves.

We need to confirm during this Lent with the people of Israel as they established before Joshua that: "Far be it from us to forsake the LORD to serve other gods! It was the LORD our God himself who brought us and our parents up out of Egypt, from that land of slavery, and performed those great signs before our eyes. He protected us on our entire journey and among all the nations through which we traveled. And the LORD drove out before us all the nations, including the Amorites, who lived in the land. We too will serve the LORD, because he is our God" (Jos. 24:16-18). (To be continued...)
