FAST AND ABSTINENCE

(From the United States Conference on Catholic Bishops) Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence for Catholics. In addition, Fridays during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence.

The norms on fasting are obligatory from age 18 until age 59. When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal. The norms concerning abstinence from meat are binding from age 14 onwards.

From Our Pastor Very Rev. Joseph Mary Lukyamuzi, V.F.

FOR MY BENEFIT, MY FAMILY AND MY CHURCH, I WELCOME AND EMBRACE LENT (Part 3)



Consecrate yourselves and be holy, because I am the LORD your God. Keep my decrees and follow them. I am the LORD, who makes you holy. (Leviticus 20:7-8)

Since this passage indicates that the people of God are to consecrate themselves, we can see that God also requires action from the people as the deal of the covenant. God explains that the people are to "set themselves apart" by keeping his decrees and following them. This consecration means to set yourself apart unto God. Isn't it wonderful to know that holiness is not achieved by our own strength or striving? Jesus' finished work on the Cross and the New Covenant He established made a way for us to draw near to God. As we do, He draws near to us and imparts of His holiness. Throughout the Bible, in times of crisis or when the Lord's help was uniquely needed, God's people consecrated themselves and sought divine help. To "consecrate" meant to "clean one's heart of sin, to prepare or rededicate oneself to God and His purpose." One who was consecrated was declared "set apart" or acknowledged as "holy unto the Lord." Perhaps the most heartbreaking picture is presented by Joshua as he speaks to Israel on the plains of Jericho. "Consecrate yourselves," he proclaimed, "for tomorrow the Lord will do wonders among you" (Josh 3:5).

God desires to do a new thing. The Lord cautioned His people saying, along this journey of consecration, make space for God to move and lead you as He desires. The Lord may speak to you differently and manifest His love and power in new ways. He'll ask you to take risks and do things you've never done before. If you're yielded to Him, the Holy Spirit will guide you on the path to possessing your inheritance. (Isaiah 30:21). Whether you are new in the Lord or have walked with Him for many years, God is inviting us into greater depths of consecration. It's time to burn the midnight oil and roll up our sleeves for spiritual things! "Consecrate yourselves, for tomorrow, the Lord will do wonders among you!" These two actions -- consecration and the promise of divine help -- represent the one proven strategy offered by God. For this Lent, if I expect a miracle in my life to break away from the bad habit that has stuck with me for a while, then as God's child, I must humble myself and purify my heart. Consecration is the prelude to the power of God to break through.

Yet, you ask, "Haven't we been in a state of consecration?" Clearly since the clergy sexual scandal in the church, the entire Catholic Church from top to bottom has been drawing closer to God. Today, a number of Catholics both in America and around the world are engaged in more prayer and fasting than ever. This is an important step as in recent month—the Lord has been vividly exposing the church's tolerance of immorality. The Lord promises us that He will be our God and we will be His people. He will dwell in us and walk among us. To access the power of Christ's promise, in which we become the literal dwelling place of God, means we must "touch not the unclean things" offered to us in our society (see 2 Cor 6:16-7:1). Paul tells us, "Having these promises, beloved, let us cleanse ourselves from all defilement of flesh and spirit, perfecting holiness in the fear of God" (2 Cor 7:1). Perfecting holiness in light of becoming the dwelling of God is the reason for our Lent and objective of consecration. Do we need a renewed sense that we are a people holy unto the Lord?
