From Our Pastor Very Rev. Joseph Mary Lukyamuzi, V.F. Easter Season 2019: THE MYSTERY OF EASTER SEALS THE NEW COVENANT (Part 3)



"Jesus came over and took the bread and gave it to them, and in like manner the fish." (Jn.21:13)

Jesus knew the importance of a good meal in the company of friends. Jesus often ate meals with his followers, His disciples, but He also chose to have table fellowship as a setting for acts of compassion, acceptance, and mercy for those who were marginalized or rejected from the community. Through these meals, Jesus demonstrated that more than one's physical needs were being met. A spiritual hunger was being fulfilled as well. On Holy Thursday, Jesus entered into a Passover meal with his disciples on the eve of His death and resurrection and deepened this sacred meal by taking the bread and announcing that this was His body. Then He took a cup of wine and announced that it would be poured out as the new Covenant. It was this experience that Jesus' followers recalled when they encountered the risen Christ. Following His Resurrection from the dead, Jesus made a number of appearances to His followers—no less than ten of these are recorded in Scripture. Beginning on Resurrection Sunday, He "showed himself alive... by many infallible proofs" (Act.1:3) and instructed His apostles and many other followers periodically for forty days. He then ascended from Mount Olivet, near Jerusalem, while the apostles watched (Act. 1:9-12). With each resurrection appearance, His followers learned something more about the risen Jesus. In order to make sense of their experience, they started making connections to that moment when He shared the last supper with them and to other scriptures pointing to the Messiah. The disciples formed communities based on the fact that Jesus was alive and in their midst. It is through the writings of Paul, particularly to the Corinthian community, that we have the first clear focus on Eucharist as a binding force of the community of believers. Unity with Jesus by the community is Paul's urgent call, since Jesus in the Eucharist wants to be united to the community. The first existing writing that the Christian church can claim focuses strongly on the unity of Jesus with a community of His followers as they celebrate the Eucharist. It is in the community remembering Jesus' command to take bread and wine that they understand the presence of the risen Christ.

I invite you to ponder seriously these word from Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI; "The Eucharist is the living and actual presence of the Risen One who permanently communicates himself in the event of the Passion and, thus, is our life." To call ourselves Christian, to call ourselves children of the New Covenant, to call ourselves members of the Body, is to be intimately entwined into Christ's passion as the early disciples did. The Eucharist is that commemoration. It is the reliving of that moment of God intimately united with man, that happy day when man and God entered once again into familial covenant. So we should never forget that every time we take the blood of Jesus at the Eucharistic meal we are renewing our covenant with God, taking on the responsibility of following Jesus to the best of our ability. This is a covenant written on hearts, a covenant of love. Every time we attend Mass, we hear the words, "Take this, all of you, and drink from it: this is the Chalice of my Blood, the blood of the new and eternal covenant, which will be poured out for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins." Drinking from the cup is a powerful reminder that Jesus shed His blood for us from the cross thereby establishing a new covenant of love! The spirituality of the Eucharist is a spirituality of love encountering the risen Savior. It was given to us out of love, we need to respond in love by taking our responsibilities seriously.
