I WALK WITH JESUS (Part 4)



"But whoever keeps his word, in him truly the love of God is perfected... whoever says he abides in him ought to walk in the same way in which he walked" (1 Jn. 2: 5-6).

Reading the life of Jesus as presented to us in the Gospels and Epistles is fascinating! These writings capture a unique point of view from each of the writers, which makes the Word come even more alive. These men walked with Jesus. They saw for three years what it looked like to follow him. 1 John 2:6 says "those who say they abide in God ought to walk in the same way in which he walked." The question is: How did Jesus walk? What did his relationship with the Father look like? Are we, who say we abide in God, walking like him? Do you realize that God is more concerned with why we do the things we do, than what we do or how many times we do it? In order to walk like Jesus, we must walk with Jesus day after day, hour by hour, and minute by minute. The way we do this is by recalling these words of Jesus; "he who follows me, does not walk in darkness" (Jn.8:12). These are the words of Christ, by which we are warned. We must imitate his life and manners, if we are to be truly enlightened and delivered from all blindness of heart. We cannot be people who walk with him just one day a week (Sunday obligation); we are called to be sons or daughters of God who say of him "every hour I need Jesus my Lord." To walk as Jesus did is the natural and inevitable outcome of living in him, and we come to live in him when God sovereignly unites us to Jesus Christ through the faith that he gives us. So, obedience, holiness, and to walk as Jesus did are just the natural and inevitable results of God's own action in our lives. To walk as Jesus did is nothing other than walking the way of charity, part of which is found in good works. When people talk about good works, they often have in mind works of charity. St. James himself says that true religion has to do with caring for orphans and widows. Also, (1 John 3:17) says; "anyone who has material possessions and sees a brother or sister in need but has no pity on them, how can the love of God be in that person?" Jesus always showed compassion and provided for those who were in need. His works mainly consisted of teaching sound doctrine, confronting false religion, and performing miracles. The apostles also followed this pattern without neglecting on works of charity.

Saint Paul writes, in reference to Christ, saying "He made Himself poor to enrich us out of His poverty" (2 Cor 8, 9); He gave His entire self for us. Through the practice of works of charity, we follow the Lord's example. In His school, we can learn to make of our lives a total gift; imitating Him, we are able to make ourselves available, not so much in giving a part of what we possess, but our very selves. We note that the entire Gospel is summarized in the one commandment of love and doing good too others. Then practicing charity becomes the means to deepen our Christian vocation. In gratuitously offering of ourselves to others, we bear witness to that love of Jesus that did not count the cost. (To be continued...)
